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
NAVIGATING NEW CHAPTERS FACILITATING A BOOK CLUB ON LEADERSHIP

MARRY ME CHICKEN

INGREDIENTS

- 3 boneless chicken breasts
- 1 tsp salt and pepper
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
 - 3/4 cup sun-dried tomatoes
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1/2 tsp red pepper flakes

DIRECTIONS

- Season chicken with salt and pepper. In a skillet over high heat, add olive oil and allow it to heat up. Then add chicken.
- Let cook for 6 minutes or until golden brown. Repeat on the other side. Remove cooked chicken to a plate and set aside.
- Reduce heat to medium and add minced garlic, broth, and heavy cream to the skillet. Stir sauce for 1 minute.
- 4. Add sun-dried tomatoes, oregano, and red pepper flakes to the mixture.
- 5. Bring sauce to a simmer, then reduce heat to medium-low. Add chicken back to the skillet, coating each side. Cook until chicken reaches 165 F.
